HOW TO GET STARTED



HOW TO SEARCH

- Click on **Search**.
- Use the **Quick Search** to perform simple word or phrase searches. For more comprehensive search options, including field searching, try the **Simple Search** or **Standard Search**.

- If you are searching for a phrase, enclose the phrase in double quotes, e.g. **“female spirituality”**

The thesis examines the provisions of Part III Housing Act 1985, their interpretation by the courts and their implementation by local housing authorities, in relation particularly to women seeking assistance as homeless persons. It is based upon a postal questionnaire survey sent to all local housing authorities in England and Wales, seeking information about practice under the Act, and follow-up visits to five selected authorities, as well as analysis of case law and other published materials. Part 1 sets out the background to the research. The present legislation is considered in its historical context, and in the light of current housing policies. The position of women in the housing market is examined, and the nature of female homelessness discussed. Research methods are described. Part 2 examines certain central concepts in the legislation as they affect female applicants: the definition of 'homelessness' itself, the 'intentional homelessness' provisions, and the meaning of 'local connection'. The issue of how homelessness decisions may be challenged, both in the courts and otherwise, is discussed. Part 3 looks in
